Why is Sheffield called the Steel City?

Key Geography Vocabulary:

Maps – they are a drawing of an area of the Earth's surface. They help us to know where places are located. They have different features like rivers, forests, buildings and roads.

Physical features – these describe the natural environment. These include rivers, hills, forests, mountains, beaches, the weather, soil, vegetation, the sea and cliffs.

Human features – these are man-made. These include a village, city, farm, office, town, shop, house and harbour.

Continents – Our Earth is divided up into seven large pieces of land called **continents**. The seven continents are Africa, Antarctica, Australia, Europe, Asia, South America and North America.

Country – this is a piece of land within a continent.

City – this is a place where people live closely together.

UK Countries – Scotland, England, Wales, Northern Ireland.

UK Capital cities – London, Cardiff, Belfast, Edinburgh.

We will be comparing these two cities.

Key History Vocabulary and Artefacts:

Chronological Order – A way of arranging actions, events or things according to the time they occurred.

Timeline – A line that shows the order in which related events happened.

Sequence of events – The time order in which something of importance takes place.

Figure – a well-known or important person.

Source – where something comes from or where it can be found.

Harry Brearley is a significant figure.

He was born in 1871 and died in 1948. He discovered stainless steel in Sheffield in 1913.
